FY16 Budget Process

- Regular Finance Team Meetings with Regional School District and both Town Managers and Town Finance Directors (July, Sept, Oct, so far)
- Met with Director of Technology, Facilities Director, and Director of Student Services to develop 5-year forecasts of needs in each area
- Beginning of November, Monomoy Administrative Team to develop FY16 Budget outline to share with School Committee
- Finance Subcommittee of MRSD met to discuss FY16 challenges

Five Year Financial Plan

- Five-year projection of enrollment, demographics, technology, facilities, and Special Education completed
- Five-year capital needs shared with Town Managers and Finance Directors last week

- Enrollment is up in Monomoy from 1902 students last year PreK-12 to 1947 students for the 2014-2015 school year

Dear Chris,

John Giorgio asked me to respond to the below inquiry related to the Town's potential liability associated with personal injuries that may occur on Town owned park and recreation land, including for personal injuries caused by dogs.

In my opinion, the Massachusetts Recreational Use Statute, G.L. c. 21, §17C, may limit the Town's potential liability for negligence if there are no fees charged for an individual's use of Town recreational land. In my further opinion, repeated injuries caused by similar circumstances, such as dog bites, for which the Town has not taken any remedial action to limit such injuries, may give rise to a claim that the Town is "reckless," which would abrogate the Town's potential immunity.

The Massachusetts Recreational Use Immunity, G.L. c. 21, §17C, ("Statute") applies if a recreation participant does not pay for the use of recreational property. Subsection (a) of the statute provides, in relevant part, that any person who "lawfully permits the public to use such land for recreational...purposes without imposing a charge or fee therefor,...shall not be liable for personal injuries or property damage sustained by such members of the public, including without limitation a minor, while on said land in the absence of willful, wanton, or reckless conduct by such person." Specifically, he Statute provides, in relevant part, that any person who "lawfully permits the public to use such land for recreational...purposes without imposing a charge or fee therefor,...shall not be liable for personal injuries or property damage sustained by such members of the public, including without limitation a minor, while on said land in the absence of willful, wanton, or reckless conduct..." [emphasis supplied]. To be liable for "reckless" conduct (which is not protected by the statute), the Town would have to have intentionally or unreasonably ignored a "high degree of probability that substantial harm will result to another." Dunn v. City Of Boston, 75 Mass. App. Ct. 556, 562 (2009). This is a fact specific inquiry. Of note, the Appeals Court has held that the failure to remedy potentially dangerous conditions due to budgetary constraints is not the kind of action or inaction that could be characterized as willful, wanton or reckless. Id. I further note that the Statute's immunity does not, however, apply in the event a member of the public brings a wrongful death claim against the Town. McCarthy v. Town of Hamilton, 9705507, 2000 WL 282929 (Mass. Super. Jan. 7, 2000).

In my opinion, if the Town does not charge individuals to use recreation land, then the immunity afforded by the Recreational Statute would apply to a negligence claim made against the Town so long as the Town was not willful, wanton or reckless in ignoring a known risk. I note that if there are repeated instances of dog bites that the Town is aware of, but no action has been taken to remediate such conditions, an injured party may claim that the Town's conduct is reckless and, therefore, not subject to the Statute's immunity. I also note that the Town may also be able, in my opinion, to assert other immunities if it is sued for injuries resulting from a member of the public's use of the recreational land in Town, including those under the Massachusetts Tort Claims Act, G.L. c. 258.

I will need to find out from Amy if the property when it was acquired or given to the Town was done as Conservation, Recreation or Park. I think it would be good for John to review the question and provide guidance. I know of a City of Newton case that has changed liability if the Town charges a fee for use but I believe that is only when a Town charges a fee for use on certain lands.

'I was leafing thru the file in the BOS /Ta files and noticed that ,in 1999, the then conservation agent asked the then TA about possible liability to the town re "hunting, dog bites, vehicular accidents, etc,"

There was not a response in the file. Would it not make sense to get an opinion from (&P on this dog attack/dog bite/dog aggression for us? I would be willing to bet that, even if there was a response to this somewhere, that case law etc has probably changed the landscape sine 1999. With multiple complaints and actual attacks in the

past couple of years, it would seem that the town is ripe for trouble.

The question would probably be some thing like, if the town knows that there is a history of dog attacks, and did nothing about it, are we liable? Even if we put up signs that any caution dogs may be off leash.

And at what point are we driving walkers out of a public area? and what is our liability then? And this is a public area, not a dog park. To my knowledge, this area has never been advertised or announced as a dog park.

We need to deal with this before we have something serious and life threatening happen.
