Mr. McManus moved approval of the Consent Agenda and the recommended actions thereon. Mr. LaMantia seconded the motion. Mr. Hughes asked to pull Item F and Mr. McManus asked to pull Item E and the Board agreed. The motion carried by a unanimous vote.

With regard to Item E and F, Mr. McManus said he has a problem which he has debated with the Town Clerk. He stated that it is his feeling that partisan politics shouldn't have any role in this but unless you appear on one of these two lists you can't apply for Election Worker in this Town and he doesn't feel it is constitutional. Mr. Clark responded that in order to prevent one party from dominating the election workers, they are trying to achieve having a similar number of Democratic and Republican election workers and he believes that unenrolled can count as well. Mr. McManus noted that the Town Clerk says unenrolled doesn't qualify and as they are the largest group in town, they should have a chance. Mr. Ballantine suggested having the Town Clerk come in to discuss this and Mr. McManus responded that this is urgent as we have until August 15 to approve the list. Mr. Ballantine recommended that they should still have the Town Clerk in to discuss this for the future and the Board agreed. Ms. Cebula moved to approve the list of election workers as submitted by the Democratic Town Committee and Republican Town Committee. Mr. LaMantia seconded the motion and the motion carried by a 3-1-1 vote with Mr. McManus in opposition and Mr. Hughes recusing himself from the vote.

OLD BUSINESS

A. License Agreement for use of the Albro House – discussion and possible vote

Mr. Clark asked for a postponement on this item as we are still in negotiations with the tenant over the insurance requirements. Ms. Cebula asked that the Board receive a draft of the license agreement.

NEW BUSINESS

- A. Use of the Cable Fund to fund the Contract between the Town and Virtual Town Hall discussion and vote to authorize Town Administrator to sign
- B. New Website discussion points and estimated costs discussion and possible vote

Mr. Clark and Mr. Banford outlined the Cable Fund request noting that it would involve a one-time \$11,000 expenditure from the Cable Fund. Chairman Ballantine encouraged discussions with the Chamber of Commerce on this. Ms. Cebula asked for accommodations for Boards and Committees to use this program as well. Mr. Clark said that the department head will determine who has access to site. Mr. Hughes noted that we need to have someone police the site to make sure nothing goes on there that shouldn't. Mr. LaMantia stated that we will need a policy statement for guidance as to what can and can't go on the website and when things should go on such as postings. Mr. McManus moved to approve using the Cable Fund for the contract with Virtual Town Hall School up to \$11,000 and authorize the Town Administrator to sign. Mr. LaMantia seconded the motion and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

C. Review of Fire Chief's goals – discussion and possible vote

Chairman Ballantine noted that the goals presented do not indicate what measures can be used to show that the goals were accomplished as they are rather general. Mr. Clark said this is a draft and

as they get closer to the budget more detail can be provided as to what they believe can be accomplished. He noted that it is premature now to set goals regarding Station 2 operation. He stated that they will detail out the succession planning for the Board and he added that the Governor's legislation is still pending and we will need to see how it develops. Mr. LaMantia stated that the goals have to be written in a way that they can recognize that they have been achieved, for example, data could be included on improving response times. Chief Clarke noted that runs to Fontaine Medical Center have recently increased 300%. He said he understood what is being asked for and he will provide the data when he has it but providing data at this time would be premature and therefore inaccurate but he assured the Board he will provide the information. Mr. McManus stated that the impact on us from other towns on the Fontaine should be included when the information is provided. Mr. Hughes said Chief Clarke should look at a longer range as the Outer Cape Health Services will be coming to town soon as well, and we need to plan for that. Chairman Ballantine asked to bring this item back with more specifics such as deadlines.

TOWN ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

A. Support Letter to MassDOT concerning Muddy Creek Restoration Project

Mr. Clark outlined the letter to MassDOT from Harwich and Chatham (see attached). No action was taken.

ADJOURNMENT

Mr. McManus moved to adjourn at 9:24 p.m. Mr. Hughes seconded the motion and the motion carried by a unanimous vote.

Monomoy Regional School District Fact Sheet

Monomoy will fully regionalize as a district in September 2014, with the opening of the newly constructed Monomoy Regional High School in Harwich and the creation of Monomoy Regional Middle School in Chatham. The vision of regionalization from 2010 becomes reality this fall with Harwich and Chatham students being educated together, experiencing an improved curriculum and expanded educational opportunities. Monomoy Regional's total enrollment is 1,903 students. Harwich children represent 73% of Monomoy's foundation enrollment, a figure that includes students enrolled within the school district, plus school choice and charter school students for which the district is financially responsible.

During the 2013-2014 academic year, one-quarter of high school aged children from Harwich and Chatham chose to attend school in other districts or charter schools in search of greater academic and extracurricular offerings. With these students went about \$1.2M in tuition dollars. As Monomoy fully regionalizes for the 2014-2015 academic year, the district is able to expand the academic programs, providing more breadth, increased rigor, adding a middle school enrichment program and a robust college-level AP program at the high school. With the new high school and these increased opportunities for all students, Monomoy hopes to build even more community pride in our schools and see more of our towns' families choosing Monomoy.

Regionalizing our middle and high schools positioned the district to eliminate 15.8 staff positions from the FY15 budget, while still improving the district's curriculum. Because of this staffing reduction, Monomoy's FY15 operating assessment to Harwich will be <u>2% less</u> than the previous year.

Harwich High School received recognition this year for being one of a select few schools in the state to have 100% of its high school students receiving Advanced or Proficient scores on the 10th grade English Language Arts MCAS exam. Concurrently, Monomoy as a district was on the College Board's AP Honor Roll for expanding the number of students taking college-level advanced placement exams and improving student's performance on these rigorous exams. Harwich High School Senior Jennifer Witzgall received the 2014 Superintendent's Scholar Award for her outstanding academic achievements, particularly in mathematics, and her commitment to the school and service to the community.

The Harwich Police Department would like to offer the following brief update:


- Year to date the Harwich Police Department has responded and/or initiated approximately 11,000 calls for service. Narcotic violations, domestic issues, traffic complaints, and motor vehicle accidents represent many of these calls for service. To assist our officers with narcotic overdoses all Harwich Police Officers will be certified in the use of Narcan.
- Telephone scams are becoming increasing popular, with one of the most prevalent being calls from fake Internal Revenue Agents stating that you are behind on your taxes and you will be arrested unless you obtain cash cards and provide the caller with the number on the card.

An additional scam that is popular occurs when a person receives a call stating that a relative has been involved in an accident or has been arrested and funds need to be transferred to help this relative.

- Officer Keith Lincoln and Officer James Connery received state awards for performing CPR on a town resident and in conjunction with Harwich Fire Personnel, revived the victim who remains in good health today. Officer Paul Boorack was commended by the Centerville, Osterville, Marston Mills Fire Department for his role in saving the lives of people at the scene of the building fire in their town. Officer Keith Lincoln was name the HPD Officer of the year as well.
- Since last summer the Harwich Police Department has instituted a program that has our bicycle patrol officers perform part of their normal patrol duties on bicycles in both the residential and commercial areas of town. We also ask that you view our new Web Page along with our Facebook Page for additional information about services we offer.
- The Harwich Police Department, as with many police departments, will see several officers retire this fiscal year, including the police chief. As of today, we expect at least five officers to retire. Thanks to the assistance of the Town Administrator and Board of Selectmen, the Harwich Police Department was allowed to hire two people over its normal number of authorized personnel so that they may enter the police academy in September. They will be able to be on normal patrol duty by next summer. It should be noted that it takes at least a year from the time a person test for the position of patrol officer to the time the person is able to patrol on his or her own.
- In an attempt to help the cost of police operations, the department continues to apply for grants. These grants include pedestrian safety grants, liquor law violation enforcement grants, security grants for the purchase of surveillance cameras for several buildings in town, COPS hiring grant for additional personnel. Many of these grants are extremely competitive and difficult to obtain.
- We invite all to two events that will be hosted at the Public Safety Building: On August 30, 2014 beginning at 11:00 A.M. the Harwich Police Association will host our annual Jail House Barbecue. We will provide free hotdogs, hamburgers, and desserts, along with dunk a cop and an inflatable for the children to run and jump on. All are also invited to attend our Citizen's Police Academy which will take place in the near future. Watch Channel 19 or check our new web site for details.

Date:	July 24, 2014

Pursuant to the Employment Agreement between Norm Clarke Fire Chief and the Town of Harwich, specifically Section 15 calls for the Town Administrator to conduct an evaluation of the performance of the Fire Chief on a formal basis. As part of that evaluation I have utilized as tools, goals and objectives. The Chief has completed a review of his previous goals and objectives and has that for the Board of Selectmen's review and secondly the Chief and I have discussed a preliminary draft set of goals for FY 15 which are attached and should be mutually agreed between the Board of Selectmen and the Fire Chief. The Chief and I did meet to go over the manager's performance report for a contract employee and I believe that overall the Chief in many categories achieved above-average and in the some categories achieved excellent, so overall rating is above average to excellent. This highly favorable rating warrants the Chief's increase for effective June 30, 2014 at 2%.

The Chief's contract also runs through June 30, 2015. The contract has terminology that calls for the Board of Selectmen to commence contract renewal negotiations with the Chief at least six months prior to the expiration date of this contract. I would like to commence initial discussions with the Chief and to put together an update to his existing Employment Agreement to present said draft agreement to the Board of Selectmen for its review and consideration. It will be my goal to bring something back to the Board by this fall well in advance of the January 1, 2015 date for renewal of the contract.

I would like to indicate that in my short time as Town Administrator I have had an opportunity to observe the Fire Chief in his capacity and find him to be an outstanding Department head and a very good person, and one that I believe will help to lead the department for the foreseeable future.

Draft FY 15 Goals and Objectives:

• To prepare a plan for manning and equipping station to provide a higher level of services than is currently provided with the deliverable of presenting said operational and financial requirements in the FY 16 budget process.

• Seek out regionalization opportunities for the enhanced utilization of Station #2 with towns in close proximity. Commence initial discussions with the Town Administrator and present findings to the Board of Selectmen of the potential opportunities.

• Succession planning. Continue to enhance the development of the deputy in the areas of budgeting, meetings and hiring process and to enhance the training of the senior Captain to promote the same.

• To explore the Governor's new community para-medicine initiative to work towards its implementation within the existing workforce and operations.

• Continue to serve as an active member of the management's collective bargaining team for the FY 16 budget year and beyond to pursue the larger Board of Selectmen goals and initiatives in this area.

Re: Design Exception Report for the Muddy Creek Restoration Bridge Project

Dear Secretary Davey:

We are writing on behalf of the Towns of Harwich and Chatham to request approval of the Design Exception Report for the Muddy Creek Restoration Bridge Project.

CDR Maguire submitted the Design Exception Report on behalf of the towns, which are jointly proposing the project. The towns will be responsible for construction of the project. Project funding comes from the towns, the US Department of Interior Disaster Relief Appropriations Act, and the US Fish and Wildlife Service National Coastal Wetlands Conservation Grant program. The project falls under MGL 85, Section 35 requiring design review in conformance with AASHTO bridge design specifications and MassDOT standards.

The towns greatly appreciate the guidance and support we have received from the MassHighway District 5 office in developing the Design Exception Report. The design exception requests have been developed to adhere as closely as possible to applicable requirements while minimizing impacts to wetland resource areas within the Pleasant Bay Area of Critical Environmental Concern (ACEC).

The restoration bridge project follows more than a decade of public actions to address degraded wetlands and water quality in Muddy Creek due to restricted tidal flow caused by undersized culverts beneath Route 28. In developing this project, the towns have partnered with the Pleasant Bay Alliance, Massachusetts Division of Ecological Restoration, Cape Cod Conservation District, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service and US Fish and Wildlife Service. The project will restore 55 acres of coastal wetlands within the Pleasant Bay ACEC. The substantial restoration benefits have engendered strong public support for the project in both towns, and have enabled the towns to secure federal construction funding. Timely approval of the design and acquisition of permits from state and federal agencies is crucial to our ability to meet federal funding timelines for construction.

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Timely approval of the Design Exception Report will greatly assist the project partners in our efforts to move this crucial project closer to completion.
