



Any relocation so requested shall be at the sole cost and expense of the requesting party.

Amy Young, wife of James Young, accepted an offer for a 20' category slip this past November 2018. Mrs. Young went on the 20' slip category waitlist on September 20, 2003; she declined a slip offer in both 2016 and 2017, and accepted the third offer as is authorized per Section 3.4 of reference (a). The 20' slip category, as indicated on the slip waitlist application, accommodates boats with an overall length of 24 feet. The overall length of the boat is measured from the furthest extension of the bow to the furthest extension astern (to include outboard motors when trimmed up). This is the total length of physical space within the water; anything larger presents a navigational hazard within the marina.

Section 2.0 Definitions of reference (a) lists a definition for Length Overall that is specific to determining dockage fees, not the physical space within the water. It specifically states "For the purpose of determining seasonal and year round dockage fees and/or mooring classification, the extreme fore-aft measurement of a boat in feet and inches in a straight line parallel to the centerline from the top of the transom to the foremost extension (includes pulpits or sprits). This definition has been in place since the Harbor Management Plan was adopted, a policy decision to not charge the boater for the added length of an outboard engine or bracket.

The definition in reference (a) for Length Overall that is specific to determining dockage fees is different from the physical overall length of the boat, and therefore Mr. Young is appealing my decision to not allow a 228 Grady White Seaferer boat that he initially stated he had purchased. The Grady White measures close to 30' length overall with the engine bracket and outboard engines trimmed up included. Mr. Young agrees that this boat would not physically fit within a 20' category slip, yet he feels he should be provided a 30' category slip instead. I disagree.

While this is the first appeal relating to this issue of Length Overall that I am aware of, I don't disagree with Mr. Young that we can make changes to the Harbor Management to better clarify the issue, which I will bring forward for consideration in the coming weeks. However, even before Mrs. Young's name came up for the third offer, this office explained the regulations and the requirements regarding boat length. And then again when we called to make the offer, the boat length requirements were again

explained. There is no doubt in my mind that Mr. Young has been fully aware of the overall boat length requirements, yet he is attempting to justify the assignment of a 30' category slip that has a significantly longer waitlist than a 20' category, due to what he considers an inconsistency in the Harbor Management Plan regulations. I think it would be extremely unfair to award Mrs. Young a 30' slip, essentially allowing her to bypass a large group of people on the 30' waitlist.

**Board of Selectman Appeal** 

To: Harwich Board of Selectmen,

My wife Amy and I are appealing the definition of LOA in The Harwich Harbor Management Plan. The purpose of this document is to provide a clear explanation our appeal and how it developed to where we are today.

In 2003, my wife, Amy Young, put her name on the 20' recreational boat slip waiting list for Saquatucket Harbor. At that time, there was no statement on the application specifying a boat less than 24' LOA for a 20' slip (which there now is). We have requested a copy of our original application and have yet to see it.

Back in early 2019 my wife was contacted by the harbormaster's office stating we were up for a 20' slip. We had previously been looking at boats and had some discussion with the harbormaster's office on how measurements are taken for length of boat. We were always under a different impression than what we were told by the harbormaster's office, as the LOA language in the Harbor Management Plan defined it differently. That lead me to set up a meeting with Jon Rendon to understand how boat measurements are deciphered.

In February 2019, I spoke with the harbormaster Jon Rendon at his office. I specifically asked about the definition of LOA and what the slip rules and regulations were. I referenced the Harbor Management Plan and discussed the language of LOA. At that time, Jon said LOA includes aft extension of outboard motors when tipped up and/ or anchor davits. This is not stated anywhere in the Harbor Management Plan. My intensions were to be proactive and bring forward a policy that was misleading, incorrect, and unfair, and to come up with a solution.

Two months later, on April 10, 2019, the Town of Harwich Waterways Committee released an agenda for the April 17, 2019 meeting. One of the topics for discussion under New Business, specifically line 4 (2:0 Definitions), is requesting to change the language of LOA more specifically to what I had brought up to the harbormaster in our February meeting. Furthermore, a manufactured length definition has since been added to clarify and take away any skepticism.

In June I brought this appeal forward to The Waterways Committee and was voted down. I feel that vote was not an accurate representation to our situation. Most of the committee and audience could not accept the fact that we do not have a boat yet and on top of that we were told that our specific boat of interest would not fit. The people of the Waterways Committee are also under the impression that we are trying to bypass the waitlist for the 30' recreational boat slips.

It is true we don't have a boat at this time. Why would we purchase the boat we want if we can't fit it in our slip? If we had the boat would that change things? It is irrelevant and should not impact the appeal. We are not arguing that our boat of interest will not fit in the slip. We know it won't fit, but our boat of interest complies to the definition of LOA and we feel we should be accommodated in the appropriately sized slip. There is room to accommodate our boat in SAQ. According to Jon, there are twelve to thirteen transient 30' slips available. If we were able to financially afford a transient slip, it would be granted. This is proof that it is not due to lack of space in the harbor. We've waited sixteen years for a slip and this appeal is by no means an attempt to bypass others on the waiting list. This is no one's fault or wrong doing. This is a policy that is inaccurate and we recognized it and have brought it forward to be addressed. We agree with the new language of LOA and fully support the change.

Jon Rendon will tell you that he 100% does not support this appeal. He does not want to deal with the potential backlash of other slip holders. Jon told me in our February meeting that he was going to make that very clear to the Board of Selectman and if they were to grant this appeal then the BOS can assume the responsibility that will come with it. If that is the case, that is not fair nor right. Jon will also tell the BOS that the definition for LOA is only pertinent to dockage fees. That is all well and good but he is not able to show anything in writing to support what he says is "the policy." How are people supposed to obtain this information if it doesn't exist? Jon also states the Harbor Management Plan is a work in progress and is constantly changing. Again, that's fine but still doesn't make things right or fair.

Towns have committees, boards, and officials. We the people look to them for answers and to also deal with issues. Certain fields require certain expertise such as a fire chief, police chief, and harbormaster. When a problem occurs, we look to our hired officials to make the right decisions. We trust their knowledge and experience. Jon Rendon has the experience and knowledge to be a great harbormaster and when a marine issue arises, we look to him for answers. In our case this is what we fear. You are going to look to the Harbormaster for the right decision as you should because this is his field, he is the professional. Except in this situation. Yes, there could potentially be some backlash but that should not affect our appeal.

In closing I ask that this appeal be looked at in a fair, equitable, and transparent way. We feel our request is reasonable. There is no documentation to support otherwise. The fact that the Harbormaster is changing the definition is proof in itself that we stand correct with our appeal. We should not be punished for a policy that is incorrect. The following attached items will further guide you through our appeal and how our boat of interest complies to the existing definition of LOA, therefore should be accommodated appropriately.

Commercial Fishing Boat: For the purposes of all contracts, lease agreements, mooring and offloading permits and waiting lists any boat that is exclusively engaged in the long lining, jigging, gillnetting, dragging, or potting of ground fish or crustaceans for sale to an authorized Massachusetts fish dealer only. A commercial fishing boat must be used solely for the purpose for which it is intended. Boats maintained for purposes of corporate entertainment under Internal Revenue Service standards shall not be considered commercial fishing boats for purposes of these regulations and waiting lists.

Deck: The surface of a wharf designed as the walkway for persons using same.

Deep Water Channel: The area of a water body wherein the depth of water is three (3') feet or more at mean low water.

Dinghy: Any small rowing skiff that is not to exceed 12' in length.

Ferry: A boat that operates as a commercial operation to transport people across a body of water on a regular schedule.

**Floats**: A floating platform designed to rise and fall with the tide anchored in position by pilings, chain, or otherwise and used in conjunction with a wharf to moor and give access to a boat.

Foreshore: A strip of land margining a body of water; the part of seashore between high-water and low-water marks.

Fresh Water Mooring Service Fee: Fee assessed for the equipment and maintenance of the Long Pond Public Mooring Fields.

Gangway: A ramp or platform used to provide access between a float or boat and a wharf.

Harbor Boat Tender Service: An individual or business entity, with adequate liability insurance (based on the Board of Selectmen's requirements) to qualify for an annual permit to transport people and goods to and from any boat, at any mooring in the Town of Harwich. This "on call service" using telephone and/or VHF radio will be a private service provided in the Town of Harwich. The individuals operating such boats need to have a current USCG license.

Horsepower: The aggregate rated horsepower of the propellant machinery at maximum operating revolutions per minute.

Length Overall (L.O.A.): For the purpose of determining seasonal and year round dockage fees and/or mooring classification, the extreme fore-aft measurement of a boat in feet and inches in a straight line parallel to the centerline from the top of transom to the foremost extension (includes pulpits or sprits).

Marina: The town-owned harbor marina and any person authorized to represent it shall be referred to herein as "the marina."

Marine Construction Maintenance Business: A business that includes but is not limited to the service of docks and moorings, building piers and bulkheads, towing boats, salvage and underwater services.

Mooring: Lines, cables, chains, mushrooms and anchors that hold a boat in place on the water and any floats, shackles, hardware associated therewith.

Mooring, Boatyard Transient: Moorings, of a transient nature, assigned to waterfront boatyards on an annual basis to accommodate the sale, repair & maintenance of watercraft. A boatyard, after the assignment of the specific number of annual mooring sites by the Board of Selectmen, can manage boatyard transient mooring sites as part of their normal business activities. The mooring inspection process would be the same as any other mooring in the Town of Harwich. Upon any change in ownership of the foregoing corporations, the new corporate entity may apply for the red mooring permits however; control of the moorings does not automatically transfer.



#### **Vessel Length Classes**

- A vessel's length class determines the equipment necessary to comply with federal and state laws.
- Vessels are divided into length classes:
  - Less than 16 feet (Class A)
  - 16 feet to less than 26 feet (Class 1)
  - 26 feet to less than 40 feet (Class 2)
  - 40 feet to less than 65 feet (Class 3)
- Length is measured from the tip of the bow in a straight line to the stern. This does not include outboard motors, brackets, rudders, bow attachments, or swim platforms and ladders that are not a molded part of the hull.



"Division",?the division of law enforcement of the department of fisheries, wildlife and environmental law enforcement.

#### **OVERALL DIMENSIONS**

#### **Options for Wastewater Partnerships**

- Intermunicipal Agreement
- Chapter 40N Model Regional Water and Sewer Commission
- Regional Wastewater Partnership Special Act
- Joint Powers Agreement
- The Subgroup selected the Partnership via a Special Act as it provides the ability of the partnership to collect an unpaid assessment from a member town from their Cherry Sheet state aid.

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#### General

- Economy of scale one treatment plant versus three treatment plants.
- This is a separate entity under Massachusetts General Law that deals only with wastewater treatment and effluent recharge. Each community remains in control of its own collection system which is about 70% of the cost of their program.

### Partnership Governed by Commission

- Proposed Seven (7) Member Commission:
  - Three (3) from Yarmouth (BOS)
  - Two (2) from Dennis (BOS and Moderator)
  - Two (2) from Harwich (BOS)
- Board of Selectmen or designated authority acting as sewer commissioners would appoint commissioners in both Yarmouth and Harwich. Board of Selectmen and Moderator would each appoint one commissioner in Dennis.
- Executive Director to oversee day to day operations.

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# **Partnership Commissioners**

- Commissioners appointed from:
  - Town Administrator
  - DPW Director
  - Wastewater superintendent or equivalent
  - Sewer Commissioner
  - Board of Selectmen
  - Finance Committee
  - Qualified Town Resident
- Three-Year terms (rotating).
- Commissioner can be removed by their appointing authority.

#### Wastewater Flow

- Average daily flow average total measured flow received in one day.
- Peak flows peaking factors applied to average daily flow to project peak day and peak month flows which are utilized to design infrastructure.
- 12-month rolling average flow the average of the previous 12-month average daily flows (flow used in Groundwater Discharge Permit).
- Wastewater flow would be measured where possible for each community or water use records at 90% where flow can't realistically be measured.

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# **Programmed Agreement Reviews**

- Initially after 5-years and then minimum every 10-years.
   Requires formal report to be produced and distributed to sewer authority in each member town.
- Revisions require 2/3<sup>rd</sup> vote of Commission followed by Town Meeting votes in each community to ratify.
- Commissioners can make rules and regulations.



#### Quorums

- Non-Financial Issues Requires four (4) Commissioners be present with a representative from each community.
- Financial Issues (over \$30K) Requires five (5) Commissioners be present with a representative from each community.
- Executive Director has authority to act on financial matters less than \$30K.

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# **Apportionment of Costs**

- Capital and Operating Costs
- Capital costs apportioned based on percent of average daily flow capacity owned in the treatment plant.
- Operating costs split into two components:
  - Semi-Fixed Costs apportioned based on percent of average daily flow capacity owned in treatment plant (staff, overhead, etc.).
  - Flow Variable Costs apportioned based on percentage of actual wastewater flow from a community treated at the treatment plant (electricity, chemicals and solids disposal).
- Cost increases not subject to Prop 2 ½.

### **Budget Process**

- November 1<sup>st</sup> Draft Fiscal Year budget (majority vote) distributed to three communities. Also 5-yr budget plan.
- Commission discusses budget with communities during November/December.
- Commission and member towns conduct a joint three-town Board of Selectmen meeting to approve Draft Partnership budget by majority vote of those present or reject for further Commission review. A quorum for this meeting shall be at least two selectmen from each town and at least eight selectmen present from the three towns.
- January 15<sup>th</sup> Final Fiscal Year budget (2/3rds vote) adopted by Commission based on Selectmen vote and send to town treasurers by February 1st. Also 5-yr budget plan.
- Commission issues three bills to Member Towns (quarterly). Can seek payment through Cherry Sheet if nonpayment.

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# Withdrawal from Partnership

- Cannot withdraw for first 15 years.
- Withdrawing community requires local town meeting vote. Then notifies Commission and jointly develops a transition plan and schedule to coordinate withdrawal. Transition plan then must be approved by local town meeting in withdrawing community.
- Withdrawing community obligated to pay any remaining share of outstanding debt plus declining operating costs over a three year period.



# **Dispute Resolution Process**

- Executive Director enforces the Agreement.
- Aggrieved party can petition the Commission to address the disputed Executive Director's decision.
- A Member Town may seek dispute resolution process to resolve an issue if not satisfied by Commission decision. Mediator utilized to help resolve.

- Address potential future treatment of contaminants of emerging concern (CECs);
- Simplifies governance for wastewater operations;
- Construction of sewers in commercial areas to promote desired economic development, smart growth, and protect historic districts; and
- Gain more points for competitive State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan program to access low interest rates.





#### Dear Ms. Pinaud:

As the authorized representative for the Town of Harwich, Massachusetts, I request an extension to the Project Approval Certificate (PAC) for the Harwich Sewer Collection System - Phase 2 (CWSRF 4424) that was issued on December 31, 2018.

The Phase 2 project included in the PAC is comprised of two construction contracts (Contract No. 1 and Contract No. 2). Bids were opened on Contract No. 1 on May 23, 2019. The Town intends to execute the Contract No. 1 construction contract with the low bidder (Robert B. Our Co., Inc.) prior to the June 30, 2019 deadline for principal forgiveness, based upon receipt of Authorization to Award received from DEP on June 26, 2019.

However, as discussed with DMS staff, the bid price for Contract No. 1 was higher than estimated. As a result, an additional Town Meeting appropriation and Town-wide vote will be required to cover the full remaining cost of the Phase 2 collection system as originally designed. The Town intends to bid a reduced version of Contract 2 in July 2019, that will fall within the total original amount appropriated for Phase 2 at Town Meeting in the spring of 2018. A third contract will likely be bid in the early fall 2019, prior to fall Town Meeting, where an article to cover the additional Phase 2 cost is expected to be placed on the warrant. This will result in a delay in the execution of construction contracts for the Phase 2 collection system until approximately December 2019, assuming the article passes Town Meeting and at the ballot box.

You received principal forgiveness on Contract 1 and that is why we needed to sign all those contract documents by June 30<sup>th</sup>. Project Approval Certificate has been extended to December 2019

MassDEP has encouraged to keep going with Contract 2 and award up to available money and have "verbally" told us Contract 3 amount will also be zero interest eligible. But this is likely if town keeps going this fall. Waiting till next spring makes it difficult for them to hold over money from different fiscal year SRF funding lists. In August 2016, the Seaport Economic Council awarded the Town of Harwich a supportive coastal infrastructure grant in the amount of \$1,000,000 for the East Dock Replacement Project at Saquatucket Marina.

In August 2017, the Seaport Economic Council awarded the Town of Harwich a supportive coastal infrastructure grant in the amount of \$1,000,000 for Landside Improvements at Saquatucket Harbor. Project will provide a new 2 story Harbormaster Department building containing offices, public restrooms & showers, a leased Snack Shack building, and an elevated deck area and waterfront boardwalk accessed by a series of ramps and stairs that provide full compliance with ADA/MAAB accessibility. A two bay garage/workshop building will be constructed, several leased Artisan Sheds added, and 90 public parking spaces added.

KEP will chair a public meeting of the Seaport Economic Council. At this meeting, 4 projects will be heard and voted on totaling \$1,497,200.

Greetings, Pelinda, Charlene and Chris .... A follow up note from meeting with the Trust ....

I would like to emphasize that in the past the way Habitat has "assisted" in finding an eligible buyer – has been by bringing in Gael Kelleher as the specialist in acting as a broker specifically for affordable resales.

I might suggest that the most useful information that might be provided to the BOS on Monday, would not be from me, but from Gael – not as to HOW she does a resale .... but a <u>description or list of the scope</u> of what she handles ... which in my experience is everything from working with the owner to prep their home to "show," to confirming the maximum sales price, to selecting a buyer in conformance with deed rider requirements, to working with Town, County, Habitat, to insure that the deed rider for the resale (which we must all agree on) is worked out in a timely fashion, and is one that bankers will lend with, to making sure the compliance certificate is issued, to informing purchasers of loan options out there for first time buyers, working with the closing attorney ETC.

I think this can go in a fairly streamlined manner with Gael's involvement and if Town, Habitat and County all try to keep things as simple as possible, acting in an efficient manner in making what few decisions we will be called upon to do.

I hope to be in touch soon to schedule a conference call. I have asked the County for a couple of possible times. I am on vacation tomorrow and Thursday (though will glance at emails), and then again all next week.

#### SELLING YOUR LOCAL INITIATIVE PROGRAM HOME

Dear Local Initiative Program (LIP) Homeowner:

The following is a summary on how to sell your home under the LIP program. We wish to emphasize that before you may begin the process of selling your LIP unit, your town/city and the Department of Housing and Community Development (DHCD) must review your written request to sell, and issue a written response.

To begin the review process, please mail the following information to both your town/city and DHCD:

Written notice of your intent to sell (Conveyance Notice). Your written notice should include your name, the property address and a phone number where you can be reached during the day.	
A copy of the <b>Deed Rider</b> for your LIP Mortgage. If you did not keep a copy, you can obtain one at your local Registry of Deeds.	
A clear <b>color photograph</b> of the exterior of your LIP unit for posting on the DHCD Affordable Units for Sale web page.	
A copy of the completed <b>Property Information Form</b> (attached).	
The above documents should be mailed to the following address:

Please contact your town or city hall for information on who will handle your resale request. You may inquire at the Board of Selectmen's office, the Housing Authority or the Planning Department.



#### MAXIMUM RESALE PRICE

After receiving the Conveyance Notice, DHCD will send a written response to you stating the price for which you may sell your home. This price is called the *Maximum Resale Price*, and is determined based on the formula in your Deed Rider. The maximum resale price of your home is calculated by multiplying the appropriate current median income by the maximum resale price multiplier factor listed in the deed rider.

For a period of 90 days, the local community and DHCD reserve the right to restrict the sale of the home to a buyer who is income-eligible under the LIP program. If an eligible buyer is located, but is unable to secure financing within the 90-day period, DHCD has an additional 60 days to locate another eligible buyer.

#### MARKETING THE UNIT

During the 90-day period, the local community will market the unit to its list of eligible buyers. For communities that do not maintain such a list, DHCD will assign a resale agent for marketing and qualifying applicants.

DHCD will post information about your property on its "Units For Sale" web page as well.

#### THE NEW BUYER

The new buyer must be income eligible under the LIP program. The local community or resale agent will verify eligibility. When the buyer's eligibility has been verified and has been approved for financing, both the seller and the buyer should retain legal counsel and sign a purchase and sale agreement. DHCD must receive a copy of the purchase and sale agreement, and the loan commitment for the buyer, in order to prepare the closing documents.

If an eligible buyer is not located during the 90-day period (or subsequent 60-day period), you may sell your home to an ineligible buyer, although preference must be given to a household earning between 80% and 120% of area median income. The price to the ineligible buyer is the Maximum Resale Price. The new buyer must sign a deed rider identical in form and substance to the seller's deed rider, and they are subject to the same rights and restrictions.
