- Events in all six regions of the state (Greater Boston, Cape & Islands, South of Boston, North of Boston, Central Massachusetts, Western Massachusetts)
- Over 70% of the events are free making art and culture more accessible
- 94% of events are free or under \$25
- There are 70+ local, regional and statewide partners working together to promote the Creative Commonwealth through ArtWeek


About ArtWeek – Presented by Highland Street Foundation and produced by the Boch Center, ArtWeek is a 10-day innovative festival featuring hundreds of unique and creative experiences that are hands-on, interactive or offer behind-the-scenes access to artists or the creative process. This annual award-winning festival was born in Boston in 2013 and has since expanded to serve communities all across Massachusetts

ArtWeek works to spotlight how the creative economy is thriving in Massachusetts by offering unique and affordable neighborhood-based events that provide increased access to art, culture, and creativity. Through community and artistic collaborations, this festival provides experiences in dance, folk and traditional arts, fashion, media arts, spoken-word, poetry, writing, contemporary visual arts, music, opera, theater, design, film, and much more.

Statewide partners include Mass Cultural Council, Massachusetts Office of Travel & Tourism as well as Mass Center for the Book, MASSCreative, MassHumanities, MassPoetry, MassAccess, Music Drives Us Foundation, New England Foundation for the Arts, New England Museum Association, Young Audiences of Massachusetts and VSA Massachusetts. 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
ArtWeek on the Road, April 27-May 6

The Harwich Cultural Center is one of twenty partners, out of 500, to be invited to participate in ArtWeek on the Road. Partnering with the Boch Center, Clear Channel Outdoor, and Lamar Outdoor Advertising, ArtWeek on the Road uses rotating digital billboards on major roadways throughout Eastern Massachusetts during the 10 days of ArtWeek to feature local artists, artworks, art installations, and/or arts organizations.

Light Up the Night, April 27-May 6

As a special nighttime salute to our arts, cultural, and creative communities, iconic buildings and structures light up during ArtWeek on different nights in multicolored splendor. "Light Up the Night" is a colorful skyline celebration representing the wide spectrum of diverse artists and creative organizations — whether a traditional arts nonprofit, individual artist, scientist, chef, or other creative professional or business — who are the innovators and champions of creativity within all of our communities.

A first time ArtWeek participant, the Harwich Cultural Center celebrates "Harwich is Creative!" A community fixture since 1937, the former Harwich Middle School has undergone adaptive reuse becoming a new cultural destination on lower Cape Cod. Harwich

Indoor Canvas Labyrinth Walk offered by Veriditas Certified Labyrinth Facilitators:

Dr. Margaret Rappaport and Darlene T. Hagon

- Dr. Margaret Rappaport will welcome participants with brief walking instructions and an opening reading focusing attention on the theme, "Inspirations for the Labyrinth".
- Darlene T. Hagon will discuss the theme by sharing her perspectives on the use of inspirational quotations of Rumi and John O'Donohue. She will also offer recorded, instrumental meditative music of Joaquin Rodrigo and Samuel Barber. Participants may choose written quotations from an urn as they enter the labyrinth to enhance meditation. The labyrinth will be surrounded with LED candles for ambiance.

- This guided walk will be about one hour. An open walk will follow and the facilitators will be available for questions and discussion.

Using SoulCollage in Conjunction with a Labyrinth Walk with Laurinda Raquel

- Note: We will meet at the labyrinth in music room and then go up to my room for the SoulCollage.
- Experience SoulCollage as a complementary process to do after a labyrinth walk. It can help to integrate the experience after a walk.
 This experience can allow for integration on all levels - body, mind and spirit.
- The labyrinth and SoulCollage both support and encourage us as we do our inner work, and are particularly helpful in restoring inner calm and clarity.



- SoulCollage originated by Seena Frost is a process for accessing your intuition and creating an incredible deck of cards with deep personal meaning that will help you with life's questions and transitions.
- The spiral path of a labyrinth is a metaphor for the journey of life. The journey to the center of the labyrinth is symbolic of the journey to discovering the inner self.

Encaustic Painting with Robin Litwin

- Robin Litwin is a Harwich artist and photographer. In 2008, she retired from a 25-year career teaching in the Art Department at Cambridge Rindge and Latin High School, where her students "inspired her every day." Robin will be demonstrating some of the basic techniques to encaustic painting which was practiced by Greek artists as far back as the 5th century.
- Robin will have all the materials on hand for participants to get a feel for this unique painting method.

Egg Tempera Painting Demonstration with Alla Zbinovsky

- Alla Zbinovsky will demonstrate the ancient technique of egg tempera painting, which she learned while living and working in Russia.
- This technique harkens back to Egyptian mummy portraits and cave paintings in India. Before oil paints were developed, this was the primary medium used by artists in the Byzantine world, where icons and frescoes made then are still luminous, even today. Egg tempera painting continued throughout the Middle Ages in Europe and the early Renaissance. Botticelli's glowing "Birth of Venus" was painted in
 - egg tempera, as were many Da Vinci's works. More recently, Andrew Wyeth used this medium in many of his paintings.
- Alla will be using pigments from natural stones and minerals, such as lapis lazuli, malachite, and cinnabar, among
 others. These pigments will be "tempered" with an emulsion made with egg yolk. The paint will be applied to a
 gessoed board or to heavy watercolor paper. There will also be an opportunity for people to try this out for
 themselves.

- This demonstration will focus on its use as a finish for fine art photographs and mixed media collages. Barbara will provide a list of resources.


